Explanation:

- `<!DOCTYPE html>` declares the document type.

 - `<head>` contains meta information, styles, and title.
 - `<body>` contains the visible content of the webpage.
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4. HTML Elements and Tags

An HTML element is defined by a start tag, content, and an end tag:

```

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<p>This is a paragraph.</p>
```

- Tags are keywords surrounded by angle brackets.
 - Some tags are self-closing, like `<br>` or `<img>`.
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5. Working with Text

HTML provides tags to structure and format text:

- Headings: `<h1>` to `<h6>`
- Paragraphs: `<p>`
- Bold and italic: `<b>`, `<strong>`, `<i>`, `<em>`
- Line breaks: `<br>`

6. Creating Links

You can create clickable links using the `<a>` tag:

```

- The `href` attribute specifies the destination URL.
 - Links can open in new tabs using `target="_blank"`.
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7. Adding Images

To add images, use the `<img>` tag:

html

```

- `src` defines the image path.
 - `alt` provides alternative text.
 - Width/height can control the image size.
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8. Lists in HTML

HTML supports two main types of lists:

1. Ordered List (`<ol>`)

```
html
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<ol>
  <li>First</li>
  <li>Second</li>
</ol>
```

2. Unordered List (`<ul>`)

```
html
CopyEdit
<ul>
  <li>Apples</li>
  <li>Oranges</li>
</ul>
```

Each list item is wrapped in an `<li>` tag.

9. Tables in HTML

Tables are created using `<table>`, `<tr>`, `<td>`, and `<th>`:

```
html
CopyEdit
```

```
<table border="1">
  <tr>
    <th>Name</th>
    <th>Age</th>
  </tr>
  <tr>
    <td>John</td>
    <td>25</td>
  </tr>
</table>
```

- `<th>` defines header cells.
 - `<td>` defines data cells.
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10. Forms and Input Elements

Forms allow users to send data to a server.

html

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```
<form action="/submit" method="post">
  Name: <input type="text" name="username"><br>
  Email: <input type="email" name="email"><br>
  <input type="submit" value="Submit">
</form>
```

Common input types: `text`, `email`, `password`, `checkbox`, `radio`, `submit`.

11. Semantic HTML

Semantic tags clearly describe the content's meaning:

- `<header>`: top section
- `<nav>`: navigation links

- `<section>`: content section
- `<article>`: independent content
- `<footer>`: bottom section

Example:

html

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```
<header><h1>My Website</h1></header>
<nav><a href="#">Home</a></nav>
<section><p>This is a blog post.</p></section>
<footer>Copyright 2025</footer>
```

12. Embedding Media (Audio, Video, and YouTube)

Audio:

html

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```
<audio controls>
  <source src="audio.mp3" type="audio/mpeg">
</audio>
```

Video:

html

CopyEdit

```
<video width="320" height="240" controls>
  <source src="video.mp4" type="video/mp4">
</video>
```

YouTube:

html

CopyEdit

```
<iframe width="560" height="315"
src="https://www.youtube.com/embed/xyz" frameborder="0"
allowfullscreen></iframe>
```

13. HTML5 APIs Overview

HTML5 introduced powerful APIs like:

- **Canvas API** – for drawing graphics
- **Geolocation API** – for getting user's location
- **Local Storage API** – for storing data in the browser
- **Drag and Drop API**

These are used with JavaScript for dynamic features.

14. Best Practices and Tips

- Always close your tags.
 - Use semantic tags where possible.
 - Keep code indented and clean.
 - Use comments: `<!-- This is a comment -->`
 - Validate your code using <https://validator.w3.org>
